-Attempt to assassinate his R. H. the Duke of Cumberland.

A valet of his royal highness, named Joseph Seillis, an Italian, who was a confidential servant, and had lived 12 or 14 years with the Duke, concealed himself in a closet in his bed room at St. James's palace, on the night of the 30th of May, for the purpose of assassinating him. He was armed with a broad sword and a razor, and remained quiet till a quarter before S o'clock, when he came to the Duke's bed side, who was in a profound sleep, from which he was roused horribly, by two violent blows on the head, which were immediately followed by two others, accompanied by a hissing kind of noise. There was a lamp and taper burning in the chamber, and by its light he perceived a letter, which lay upon his table, completely covered with blood .-This immediately struck him with the idea that there was a murderer in the room, and he accordingly struggled as quickly as he could out of bed. At this moment a naked sabre was dropt upon the floor, and he perceived the figure of a man flying into the yellow room, and escaping on towards the appartment in which Seillis slept. He went down stairs, aroused his page, and gave the alarm thro' the house of murderers. On returning up stairs, he found the sword which had been dropped, was his own regimental sabre, and also found a pair of slippers belonging to Seillis. Seillis was one of his own valets, and had never incurred his displeasure, nor could he imagine any motive likely to prompt him to this extraordinary attempt.

He seems, from the wounds received by his royal highness, to have begun in a most savage manner, to have cut at his royal highness in different parts -for the Duke has the front of his leg cut, a wound in his arm, one on his forehead, and another on the cheek, supposed to have been done by the ra-'zor, after he had closed with the assassin. He has also one of his little fingers nearly cut off. It was some time, as the villain cut at him with such quickness, before he could extricate himself from the bed. A sergeant's guard immediately came to the door which was opened quickly by the porter, and the guards rushed up stairs. There they found the Duke faint with loss of blood, which was sreaming from his wounds. After having conveyed the assassin, having taken care to prevent all possibility of his escape .-They searched the duke's chamber and the closets without effect. But it seems as soon as he heard the Duke open the window and call for assistance, he retired to a water-closet and cut his throat with a razor in such a manner as nearly to sever his head from his body. He was quite dead.

Had the embargo produced no other

good effect than preserving us at peace, during the ravages of a wide spread war, without compromising our honor, it would deserve the thanks and approbation of every friend to his country. But it did much more, without mentioning its happy effect on the extension of manufactures, that calumniated source of public economy; that butt of half fledged politicians and ignorant egotists, who affecting to know so much and feel so much for public liberty, are its most fatal enemies; men who did not know that to it alone we owe the order of the 26th of April, 1809, taking off the infamous and monstrous blockade by the British of all the continent of Europe except Sweden! Who do not know that to it we owe that we can even now trade to Russia and Denmark? That to it we owe the taking off the infamous tribute, which has no example since the tea tax, which caused our glorious revolution? Or are these plagiary politicians, these mock Chathams and pseudo Aristides, ready to declare that these things, the gracious proofs of the love that the cabinet of St. James's entertains for us, and that abandoned these established outrages voluntarily, when at the very time of their existence, they had nineteen editions of Pickering's letter, telling them " they had done us no harm," and a legislative resolve by Mr. Gore,

gainst the standard of their enemy? The embargo would have done more, had it not been, to the disgrace of free government, menaced down: as the violation of Mr. Erskine's agreement and the base French seizures fully prove. But alas, it is too late to reflect upon these things.

LATE FOREIGN NEWS.

LONDON, June 7.

An important piece of intelligence has been received from Sweden. The Crown Prince, the intended successor to the usurper of the throne of Gustavus, is dead. He was reviewing some troops in the neighbourhood of Helsingborg, when he suddenly fell from his horse and expired. The Gottenburg papers attribute it to an apoplexy; the reports of private persons assign poison as the cause, and that this was ascertained on an examination of the body after his decease. Men are apt to suppose that when princes die suddenly, their deaths are occasioned by violent means. We find, however, that legs and feet very large; has a small white spot on his back, occasioned by the saddle; left us! his journey. Had poison been the cause, his death would have been more lingering. We should not have found him able to review his troops and sit on horseback only the moment before he died. His death has given great confidence to the party that espouses the cause of the son of Gustavus, and a letter from a correspondent mentions an insurrection to have taken place in his favor at Stockholm.

Private Correspondence.

"HARWICH, June 6. "We have this day had three vessels from Rotterdam, with passengers; and a packet from Gottenburgh with mail and passengers. By the former we learn that the king of Holland and his wife have left that country, and that he has positively abdicated his throne, the consequence whereof, it is considered, will be the numediate annexation of Holland to France. The country therefore is represented we being in the greatest consternation and sumult; and several of the most respectable houses are making up their affairs to quit the country.-The feelings of the Durch are said to be now worked up to a pitch, that they are ripe for revolt, (but, I fear, any attempt would be but in vain)
It is, however, confidently reported in Holland that hostilities are about to commence between France and Russia, whose emperor is stated to be in such complete dislike, that it is expected he will share a similar fate to his predecessor.

"By the Gottenburg packet, we have advices of an insurrection at Stockholm, a strong party having shewn themselvs in favour of the son of the dethroned Gustavus; and Frederick of Augustonburg, the declared hereditary prince, has been poisoned! Whilst taking an airing on horseback, he suddenly fell, and expired immediately, and on examining his body, it was found that his death had been occasioned by poison."
