# FOREIGN NEWS.

FROM ENGLAND.

Boston, May 12.—Yesterday arrived at this port, the Spanish brig Isabel, from England, via St. Michaels. We are indebted to the politeness of a passenger, for files of London papers to the evening of the 29th of March; and for the following information in manuscript:

"The Isabel brings papers and letters from London to the Soth of March. On her leaving St. Michaels, on the 18th of April, accounts had been received there from London to the 2d, and from Cork to the 7th of that month, and from Paris to the 28th of March.

These accounts stated, that there was a division in the British Cabinet relative to the question of renewing the war with France. Lord Liverpool opposed it, upon the ground of the present resources of England being inadequate to that object. Lord Castlereagh, and the majority of the Ministers, were for joining the allies in the general cause against Bonaparte .-In consequence of this dissention it was expected that Lord Liverpool would retire from office.

.It is stated that the Duc d'Angouleme was at Marseilles, the inhabitants of which city hold out for the Bourbons; and that the Duc de Bourbon was in La Vendee, with a considerable force. Napoleon had another review of his troops in Paris on the 27th; but it did not appear that he had presented himself any where else in publie. He had adopted several mild measures, with a view of showing pacific intentions.

Louis the 18th was at Ghent, with part of his family and many of his civil and military officers.

An immediate embargo was executed in all the ports of France. Dieppe had been declared by Napoleon

open to the intercourse with England and the other Powers. A proclamation had been made by the Duc de Castiglione, (Augereau) to the 14th military division, which he commauded, declaring that the army had been deceived and disgraced by the Bour-

bons, and that the Emperor was the only one who could restore its former glory. The Moniteur stated that the absence merely on a visit to his father-in-law in

The accounts from Vienna stated that the news of Bonaparte having reached Lyons had arrived there, and had decided the Emperors of Austria and Russia, and the King of Prussia, then in that city, to order the most prompt and vigorous measures to be adopted. Forces were ordered to be marched from all quarters towards the Frontiers of France. That Prince Schwartzenberg was to command the Austrian; Prince Blucher the Russian; and the Duke of Wellington the English, Dutch and Hanoverian

That the Archduchess Marie Louisa was to take her title of Duchess of Parma, Placentia, &c. and had, by the advice of he Emperor her father retired from Vienna to the interior of Germany.

That Joachim, the King of Naples; had signified to the Congress at Vienna is intention of opposing Bonaparte and ining the Allies.

Accounts from Brussells stated that part of the Prussian army had already passed the French frontiers, and that roops were advancing from all quarters towards the Rhine; also that Murat had offered his support and 80,000 men in the general cause.

LONDON, MARCH 20. A Dutch Mail arrived this morning,

and brought accounts from Brussels and Holland to the 20th inst. They are full of the preparations for immediate, active war. Accounts from Emmerick of the 20th state, that all the Prussians in that neighborhood crossed the Rhine the day before, and proceeded by forced marches to Creveldt. The Hanoverean troops are conveyed to the frontiers in waggons. There will in a few days be 150,000 men on the line from Treves to Nieuport. We trust they will march into France without delay. Bavarians, Austrians, Prussians, British are all in mo-

Militia warrapts, we understand, are made out for embodying the militia. Accounts from Vienna say, that Bona-

don this intention. In England, Wm. Roberts, late of Fairsley, near Leeds, has been convicted under the Bankrupt Law, with not surrendering to the commission issued against him, and sentenced to death.

LONDON, March 23. On Thursday an extraordinary scene

was witnessed in London. The unwieldy state coach of the lord mayor was drawn by the populace to the Mansion House, on his lordship's return from presenting the address to the prince regent on the corn bill. Mr. Alderman Wood's carriage immediately followed. was also drawn in the same manner. On arriving at the grand staircase, his lordship standing between the mace and the sword bearer, and attended by his chaplain and other officers, made a low reverence to the people, and was greeted with loud
