She was seated in a kind of wicker basket and suspended 20 feet, perhaps, by cords from the balloon, with the parachete floating loose between her and the balloon. At about 20 minutes after 4, the balloon was set at liberty; the wind was very strong from N. yet the balloon was so well charged that it ascended at an angle of about 60 degrees, and at the rate of about a mile in three minutes. In two minutes from the time she started, she disengaged herself from the balloon, at the neigth, I should judge, of 2500 feet from the ground, and descended like lightning, a short distance, when the parachute opened and she was gently let down to her mother earth, after an absence of about five minutes.
