LAW INTELLIGENCE.

Philadelphia, March, 1816. Fitch vs Porter.

This was a writ of fieri facias, issued on judgment of \$100, entered March 5th, 1816, with interest from that date and costs, returnable to March term, 1816 .- The defendant paid the money in bank notes, into the hands of the sheriff a considerable time before the return day, and the plaintiff's at-torney applied to the sheriff to pay the money over, which he refused to do. and said he would retain it in his hands until the return day. The attorney then gave notice to the sheriff, that if the money was not paid immediately, nothing but the legal money will be received by the plaintiff. The sheriff treated this notice with contempt and laughed at the notion of the plaintiff's attorney that he could compel him to pay the money called for by the execution, in specie. On the return day of the writ, Bigelow, for the plaintiff, obtained a rule on the sheriff to return it ... The sheriff returned" ... re-ceived debt, interest and costs."

On the 16th of March, 1816, Bigelow, obtained a rule on the sheriff, to pay the money into court, and at the same time gave notice to the prothenotary not to receive any thing but specie. To this rule the sheriff made no retarn or answer, and on the to show cause why an attachment should not issue against him for contempt of court, in not paying in the money according to the rule, returnable this day.

Mr. Elliot, the under sheriff, who had the sole management of the business now came into court to answer the last rule. He stated that the sheriff had received the amount endorsed on the execution from the defendant, in Philadelphia bank notes, and had offered to the plaintiff to pay into court, the same kind of money he had received from the defendant; but Mir. Bigelow had required payment in specie, which he would pay, if the court were of opinion that he was bound by law to pay in specie, but this would be very hard upon the sheriff, when he received bank notes from the de-

Bigelow .- If there be any hardship on the sheriff in this case, he has brought it upon himself. I offered to receive payment in bank notes, but he would not give them to after the return day of the writ." The only question which can now be before the court, is, whether or not bank notes are money. The writ calls for money. The sheriff has tendered bank notes, and I have refused to receive them, because I say they are not money: they are mere promissory notes. Judge Hemphill--11 that is the only ques-

FREEDOM OF THE PRESS IN CHINA.

The following extract from the Quarterly Review, for November, contains some curious information respecting the light in which the freedom of the press is regarded in China, and at the same time shews what is meant by mercy in a despotic government. -1N.1. E. Post.

"The mixture of good and evil to which who transgresses those laws, and who is convicted of having offended them! Niceand minute as the distinctions are in the Chinese code, between the degrees of crime and the correspondent scale of punishment, the laws regarding the press are still vague and undefined. The Lou-tec says,

"Whoever is guilty of enditing wicked and corrupt books, with the view of missuffer death by being beheaded; the principals shall be executed immediately after conviction, but the accessaries shall be reserved for execution at the usual season;" and "all persons who are convicted of printing, distributing or singing in the streets, such dis-orderly and seditious compositions, shall be

"These laws, regarding the press, are public by an authority not to be questioned. In the year of 1777 there appeared in the Pekin Gazette the trial and condemnation
