t is now the law of the land : 1. Be it further enacted, That an annual tax of upon every male free negro of the age of twentyne years and sinder fifty five years, to be ascer tained and assessed on each, by the commissioner of the revenue in every year, and collected by the sheriffs or other collectors of the public revenue as other public taxes or levies upon free negroes are collected. All such taxes shall be accounted for with the Auditor in the present year, and every year hereafter, and paid into the Treasury other public taxes. And an account therefor shall be raised on the books of the Auditor and reasurer. The fund arising from this source all be applied to removal of the free negroes from his Commonwealth, in the manner prescribed in the foregoing sections of this act, and in addition to the appropriation therein made, or in any such manner as the Legislature may at any time rescribe. And it shall be the duty of the Counand Corporation Courts, to charge the legal negro, and to account with the Auditor of Public ccounts for such tax and pay the same into the bie the Auditor and Treasurer to enter all such moneye to the account directed to be raised in

the preceding part of this section; and the same shall be applied to the objects thereof. 2. Be it further engeled, That it shall be the duty of every free negro so taxed and accessable as well to report himself to the commissioner of he revenue, as for the commissioner to call on
