

You will observe that this or does not furnish him with a legal list of his property with values affixed at the time he is vis-ited by him, he is required upon being furnished by the commissioner with proper forms for so doing to make out and furnish him, or deposit in the Clerk's Office of the county within ten days of his visit a legal statement of the property liable to taxation, together with values affixed to the several classes thereof sworn to by him.

All lists of property are required to be sworn to whether the value is affixed or not.

No time is fixed in my instructions in which I shall make out my lists and return them to the Aulitor, but I have no doubt the Legislature will rescribe the shoriest time possible The commissioner has other and heavy duties to perform besides listing and valuing personal prop-erty, the most important of which is the careful and accurate annual revision and alteration of the Land Book.

To render a person eligible to one of these offices, it is not required that before, or at the time of the election, he shall be a resident of the coun-ty or district for which he is elected. His fitness for the office in this, as in every other re-spect, is left to be judged of by the voters. But it is required that these officers shall, during their term of office, reside in the counties for which they shall have been elected, and if elected for a dis trict, that they shall during their terms of offic-reside in that district. 



TO RAISE CUCUMBERS. We are indebted to a friend for the following method of raising cucumbers, which he assures us he has known practised with the most satis-lactory results. He is a bachelor himself, and consequently has had no opportunity of person-ally testing its expediency, but some of the finest cucumbers he has ever seen were raised in this way. The experiment will cost but little, and is certainly worth the trial. Squashes and me-lons may be raised in the same manner.—Van-demecum.
