The sentinel was relieved from his post, and took his place among the new guard, one of whom was posted, and the detachment was heard tramping across the bridge to relieve in the same manner the other sentinels; as they came on, tramp tramp! like the statue of the commander in "Don Giovanni"-the young Virginian conceived an idea as bold as it was original. It

was difficult to travel along the narrow ledge without falling into the black gulf below; and it was questionable whether any friendly water pipe would enable him to "flank" the mined to make the attempt. From that moment he kept a close watch on the move-bridge. Why not "fall in" in the darkness with the unsuspecting detachment, pass through the guard beyond, and then take the chances of making his escape? His resolution was at once taken, and as the guard came opposite his place of concealment behind quietly stepping over the railing fell in be-

His ruse was crowned with complete success. He passed with the detachment undiscovered to a point beyond the bildge, and which the pitch darkness rendered by no means difficult-he concealed himself until the unsuspecting Federals disappeared. He then crawled on his hands and knees, crouching close to the ground, by another picket which he saw upon the road, and reaching a point where he believed himself beyond range, rose to his feet and commenced moving. All at once he saw before him another picket fire, and not knowing whether it was crouched down and slowly approached the fire, crawling upon his chest along the sur-

face of the ground. "Several Virginia papers are discussing the feasibility of reuniting the State by the absorption of West Virginia. The subject is come up in consequence of the attempt of the State of West Virginia to get possession of the counties of Berkeley and Jefferson, against the wish of the inhabitants, by the same ficticious process by which the State was originally divided. If there is any legitimate process by which the two Virginias can be consolidated into one, Congress will read-ily give its assent. Two Virginia Senators will thus be got rid of. In fact, Congress would not have consented to the division of the State if the result of the war had been forseen. It was an act of faithlessness aud

This is plain talking, but we did not expect to hear it so soon. There must be a screw loose somewhere. Willey and Van Winkle, the W. V. Senators must be too conservative to suit the tastes of the New England radicals; must certainly be known to look upon a white man as better than a negro, and to be opposed to giving the "African gentleman" the right of voting, holding offices of honor or trust, or mixing with white folks upon terms of social equality.

We can point out a mode by which the Times, and others of the same way of thinking, can accomplish their desire of getting rid of these two extra Senators, and it is simply this: Carry the case to the Supreme Court of the United States. Congress swallowed the proposition, however, as a "War Measure;" but the Supreme Court cannot be guided by the opinions of military men, or by military necessities-the Constitution, and the laws passed in pursuance thereof, are alone to be considered by it; and as that august tribunal is generally thought to be composed of the ablest lawyers of the land, free from party and all other prejudices, the West Virginia military necessity will be declared no longer existing, and the State ordered to return to its former

The second bill introduced by Mr. Sumner, rovides that where in 1860 one-sixth or more of the population was of African descent, the negroes shall compose one half of the grand and petit juries where a negro is concerned in

The third bill prescribes a new oath of alegiance, which not only binds the party to maintain a Republican form of government in the State in which the party is resident and in the United States, but also obligatees the swearer to resist any attempt to repudiate or postpone the payment of the public debt, and to discountenance any laws making any

distinction of color or race. The fourth bill is designed to enforce the Constitutional amendment by punishing any attempt to control the services of any person contrary to the provisions against it.
