The 5-20 bonds, now payable, are to be exchanged for the new bonds, and so with other bonds when they become payable. If holders of bonds prefer, they may demand payment of the same in legal tenders, provided there are not at any time more than \$400,000,000 greenbacks in circulation. The bill also provides for the issue of a foreign 41 per cent. bond, payable, principal and interest, in coin in from 20 to 40 years, in Frankfort or London.


