While this process is going on, the symptoms of pulmonary consumption, with its cough, hectic fever, Se., show themselves. How and under what couditions of the animal economy is tubercle formed, has been a question not yet satisfactorily solved. As a general thing we can say, that whatever tends to weaken the body by interfering with healthy digestion and the making of good blood, predisposes to the formation of tubercle. It is only of late times that this substance has been admitted to be propagated on occasions by contagion and inoculation. For a long time, however; the people of the south of Europe entertained the belief that consumption is contagious, and that the infection might extend to the clothes and bedding of the patient, and hence after his death these articles, vere ordered to be burned.

Mr. Chauveau purchased four handsome heifers, and he tuberculized three of them by causing them to swallow an ounce of tuburulous matter, taken from the body of an old hthisical cow. The result was wonderfully rapid. At the end of twenty days the first cow had lost flesh to a surprising extent ; its pulse was quick and full, and it coughed incessantly. At the end of fifty-two days it was killed, and it presented perfectly marked tuberculous changes, especially about the me-sentery, or that part through which the chylous vessels pass from the small intestines to the duct that empties its contents into the great vein near the heart. The intestines of the animal were also tuberculous. The lung was full of crude tubercle. 
Heat at Great Depth.

A curious fact has been lately brought to notice in regard to the Nevada silver mines. Heat, not water, is the chief enemy encountered after reaching a great depth, and instead of pumping out water, the companies have to pump in air. A Nevada paper says : The increase in the heat in our mines is now beginning to give many of our mining companies more trouble, and is proving a greater obstacle to mining operations in those levels

lying below a depth of one thousand than any vines or "pocket" deposits of yet encountered. A number of the le companies on the Comstock are now en in putting in engines to be used expressly for driving tans for furnishing air to the lower levels, forcing it through large tubes of gal-vanized iron. With this great increase of heat in the mines, comes a great decrease of water; in fact, in our deepest mine, the Bal-lion, which has attained the depth of twelve hundred feet, not a drop of water is to be seen; it is as dry as a lime-kiln and as hot as an

In the lower workings of the Chollar-Potosi mines, which have a perpendicular depth of eleven hundred feet beneath the surface, the thermometer now stands at one handred degrees,-a frightful heat to be endured by a human being engaged in a kind of labor calling for severe muscular exertion. Here, also, we find the water to have decreased till there is at the present time a very insignificant amount.

RAILROAD EXTENSION.

We have shown the importance, in previus issues of our paper, of the extension of he Cumberland Valley Railroad through the ounty of Jefferson. The interest excited upon he subject, and a possibility of the adoption of the route suggested, extending through this county and Clarke, and thence through the Euray Valley, induced a number of our leading citizens to unite in'an invitation to Maj. WATTS, the Chief Engineer of the Cumberland Valley Railroad, to visit our town .-This invitation was accepted, and on Thurs day last the Major paid us a visit, when a full and elaborate consultation, of an informal character was held between him and the gentlemen who were appointed a committee at the meeting held at Hooff's Hall on the 5th. As the visit of Major Watts was entirely unofficial, of course nothing definite was elicited by the consultation ; yet it afforded an opportunity of laying before him a vast amount of information in regard to the proposed route that may be valuable hereafter in determining the location of the road south of the Potomac river, whenever the company may decide upon its extension. An estimate of the cost of an experimental survey or reconnoisance of the country between Powell's Bend-the point on the Potomac to which the road is now located -has encouraged the committee to enter into preparations for such a survey at once, and it is expected that the services of Messrs. John & David E. Henderson and J. B. McElroy will be engaged to furnish a topographic map of the country from the point above specified to Charlestown, in the shortest possible time for its accomplishment. THE TEST-OATH Hon, John S. Millson's Opinion

The Norfolk Journal of Saturday last con ins a correspondence between Col. J. R. Lewellyn, its editor, and Hon. John S. Millson, on the subject of the test-oath. We copy Colonel Millson's brief and comprehen-sive letter. It is unanswerable :

NORFOLK, August 26, 1869. Dear Sir :- I received yesterday your letter asking my opinion on the question "Wheth-er the test-oath can be legally imposed upon he members elect of the Virginia Legislature." You refer, of course, to any other test-oath than that contemplated by the third section of the 14th constitutional amendment. Much has been said and written upon this

shall be "deemed provisional only," until le-gal governments shall be established, and they provide the means by which "legal State governments" may be constructed; or, in pular phrase, reconstructed. Here, it will be observed, the distinction i

carefally drawn by Congress between legal State governments and those not legal and declared to be provisional. Their express obect was to get rid of the latter by authorizing he people to establish the former. They never authorized or intended to suthorize the people to construct a "provisional" govern-ment, or any other form of State government that they had themselves pronounced not to

There are two interests touched by this be legal. The power was only to form a legal State government, and if that was not formed, then there was no power to do anything else, and the work done was simply a nullity. Congress reserved the power to determine whether the people of any of these States, in attempting to reconstruct a legal State gov ernment, conformed to the requirements of the law. By section seven of the act of April 10, 1869, they provide " that the proceedings in any of said States shall not be deemed final or operate as a complete restoration thereof.

cide that Virginia has complied with the pre-scribed conditions, then the government lately formed will be declared to be a legal State government-legal, not from the time of such recognition only, but from the date of its original establishment; and the acts of such government, so recognized, will be as vilid as if done before, as if done after the recognition by Congress. A familiar example of this principle will be found in the acknowledgment by one nation of the independence or new formation of another.

To argue that because it is not yet declared or known that the government established by Virginia is a legal State government it must be treated as an existing illegal government seems to me inconsistent in itself and wholly subversive of the objects of Congress. assumes that the people of Virginia, in the exercise of a power given to them to construct a legal State government in the place of that declared not to be legal, could establish a new illegal government, which must be checked and restrained by the same guards applied to the former illegal government. This, indeed

would be to make the new government illegal, from an apprehension that it might be declared to be so; for it can scarcely be disputed that a rejection, by a foreign authority, of members of the Legislature, qualified to hold their seats by the Federal and State laws, would so vitiate the constitution of the body itself as to render their acts utterly invalid I cannot suppose that senators chosen by such

an assembly, would be admitted to seats in the Senate of the United States. I think, then, there is no force in the obections that because the constitution has not been approved by Congress the members elect of the Virginia Legislature must be regarded and treated as members of an illegal or provisional government. Congress, in authorizing elections to be held according to the arrangements of the new or proposed constitution, in advance of its approval, and not under the old constitution, designed that the proceedings of these Stato in their efforts to establish legal State governments should be assumed to be lawful and regular, until, in the exercise of their reserved authority, they should, by withholding their approval, undo

all that was done. Should they do this, there would be surely no need for adopting precautions against the admission of dangerous or inment or just nothing at all. It is impossible that the government shall be at the same time both legal and illegal ; both State and provisional.




