A heavy freight train was coming up the Lake Shore road. All I will say of the escape of this is that it did escape to the side track, and only escaped by the last minute of possibility. Running on to a safe distance from the depot, the engineer of the oil train detached his engine and left the cars to consume. He says his situation was fully realized by him. He expected to lose his life. At every moment he was going at a perilous rate of speed. but there was no help for it. The demon was behind, and he declares that it looked like a demon. 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

SALE OF GOVERNMENT PROPEL TY AT HARPER'S FERRY.

We are glad to learn that the Secretary of War has ordered the sale of the above valuable property. This order is in obedience to Act of Congress passed at its last session which directs that officer, upon the conditions and with the reservations named in the Act, to sell at public auction, all the property owned by the United States in Harper's Ferry and vicinity. The time of sale, is left at the discretion of the Secretary. When this Act was passed and until quite recently, a Suit was pending in the U.S. Court, in which the Plaintiff claimed title against the Government. to land which controls the entire water power of the Potomac, heretofore used for the U.S. Armory. During the pendency of this Suit, it was doubtless wise to suspend the sale of the property-but the title of the Government having now been established, there seems no reason why the law of Congress should not be executed without delay. Directly and indirectly, the Government, has expended

millions of dollars upon its property at Harper's Ferry-and before the destruction of the magnificent works it had erected there. the War Department might well regard it as constituting one of the most efficient means of the National defence. But although this property presents now a scene of ruin, and its value to the Government is insignificant compared to that which it possessed before the war, still for manufacturing purposes, too high an estimate can hardly be placed upon it .--The power almost unlimited, both of the Potomac and Shenandoah rivers, is fully and splendidly developed, and ready at once to set in motion the mightiest machinery that human ingenuity and skill can construct. indictments. This is too much of a good thing, as it is not likely that one-third of these indictments will ever amount to anything, but be the means of entailing useless expense on the county. Many of the indictments found were evidently the result of a puritanical prejudice, which in justice should have no infuence in the deliberations of a grand jury. Their duties should be circumscribed to the honest and impartial investigition of all matters looking to the preservation of the publie morals and to the protection of the general interest of the community, but in doing this they should not allow any of their preconceived individual notions of morality to govern their deliberations. All violators of the law should be brought to punishment, but for a grand jury to seriously entertain and deliberate upon every trivial complaint made to them through ill-will, spite or prejudice, is beneath the dignity of such a body, and cer- size. tainly not intended to be embraced within the sphere of their sworn duties. A grand jury should have, at least common sense enough to discriminate in such matters, and not burden the docket with a whole batch of petty indictments, which, when sifted, will amount to nothing. We are not personally, aggrieved at any indictments found by the last Grand Jury ; but if our information be correct, and we have no reason to doubt it, we do think they meddled with some things which should have been beneath their consideration, and took cognizance of others which they could not help but know, were prompted by prejudice and ill feeling on the part of the complainants. This was all wrong, and can have no other result than to stir up animosities and entail useles expense upon the country. In our humble opinion no man should sit as a Grand or petit Juror who is

not able to sink his prejudices and take an enlarged and liberal view of matters which may come before him pertaining to the general good. WELL SAID .- The Grand Jury at the recent term of the Berkeley Court, made one hundred and sixty indictments! The people of the county must be entirely outlawed, or y else most of these charges have been the result of personal malice or petty spleen. On the latter presumption, the New Era remarks as follows :--

The Grand Jury for the present term court brought in about one hundred and sixty indictments. This is too much of a good thing, as it is not likely that one-third of these indictments will ever amount to anything, but be the means of entailing useless expense on the county. Many of the indictments found were evidently the result of a puritanical prejudice, which in justice should have no influence in the deliberations of a grand jury. Their duties should be circumscribed to the honest and impartial investigition of all matters looking to the preservation of the publie morals and to the protection of the general interest of the community, but in doing this they should not allow any of their preconceived individual notions of morality to govern their deliberations. All violators of the law should be brought to punishment, but for a grand jury to seriously entertain and deliberate upon every trivial complaint made to them through ill-will, spite or prejudice, is beneath the dignity of such a body, and certainly not intended to be embraced within the sphere of their sworn duties. A grand jury should have, at least common sense enough to discriminate in such matters, and not burden the docket with a whole batch of petty indictments, which, when sifted, will amount to nothing. We are not personally, aggrieved at any indictments found by the last Grand Jury ; but if our information be correct, and we have no reason to doubt it. we do think they meddled with some things which should have been beneath their consideration, and took cognizance of others which they could not help but know, were prompted by prejudice and ill feeling on the part of

the complainants. This was all wrong, and can have no other result than to stir up animosities and entail useles expense upon the country. In our humble opinion no man should sit as a Grand or petit Juror who is not able to sink his prejudices and take an enlarged and liberal view of matters which may come before him pertaining to the general good. The best, most judicious and clear-headed men should always be selected for such positions. Recently, we are sorry to say, our juries have not been selected accord-

The Four Gates of Hell-A Genuine Hard-Shell Baptist Sermon.




