The Russian-

harvest is stated to have been good, and the crops have dowhere failed a completely as in some places last year. The lodder is every-where poor, with the exception of a few mondsome places last year. The toddet is every-where poor, with the exception of few mon-tainous districts. There has been very little clover, and both the hay and surrogate have

been much injured by the untavorable weather. On the other hand, there has been a good deal of straw. Both potatoes and beets have suffered from the heat drouth of July and the rain of August. The disease has also appeared with more or less viralence in some parts. The hopes entertained for the potato harvest are not, therefore high ; but it is said that the beet is improving. The hops are said to be in a very poor condition, partly on account of the weather and partly from the insects and the diseases, which have appeared in many partiens. Soldiers eaten by Cannibals.

The London Daily. News says : "If any of us look forward to being eaten by cannibals, he may wish to be informed how he is likely to be cooked. It is a comfort to know that the savages who may devour him are by no means devoid of refinement in their culinary disposition. Some French soldiers were lately taken prisoners by the Kanaks, and one of them was killed and eaten. His comrades describe the process. The Kanaks first decapitate their victim; a matter of no small difficulty, considering the bluntness of their hatchets. Ten to fitcen blows are necessary. The body is then hung up to a tree by the feet, and the blood allowed to run out for an hour. Meanwhile a hole a yard and a half walls, and the glare of the lightning flashed through the shutterless windows, There was a pile of straw on the fireless hearth, and a cradle beside it. But it was not this that midst of them a great fire is lite When the wood is burned down a little and grows with heat, it is covered with more stones. The man is then cleaned out and divided in pieces about a foot long and the hands and feet being thrown away as worthless. The pieces of the man are placed on the leaves of a large rose tree peculiar to the tropics. The meat is surrounded with cocoa nuts, banana, and some other plant noted for their delicate flavor .-The whole is then tied together firmly, the fire is removed from the pit; the meat is placed in among the bot stones and mefully covered, is left to cook for an hour.

Women do not partake of this warrior's feast. Men alone are permitted to enjoy so great an honor and so rare a delicacy."

THE RESULT IN WEST VIEGINIA. From the Wheeling Register, of Friday, we are at last able to form a tolerably definite idea of the result of our State election last Thursday week. It exceeds our most sanguine hope. While our neighboring States of Pennsylvania and Ohio seem to have abated but

little of their determination to adhere to the fortunes of Radicalism, West Virginia, nninfluenced by their example, has most emphatically called a halt. After a calm and undemonstrative canvass, conducted almost entirely by the press of the State, upon the single issue of partisan proscription, the voters of West Virginia have changed front with a dreadful suddenness, and by a startling uprising have laid out the policy of disfranchisemont as cold as Sir John Franklin's hones

We have tolerably fair returns from forty counties in the State, which elect forty-six members to the House. Of these the Dem ocrats have twenty. The liberal Republicans supported by the Democrats on the platform of the prompt repeal of all Test Oaths and disabling measures, number ten, from the following counties : Marshall. 1. Tyler 1 Berbour 1, Upshur 1, Mineral 1, Grant and Hardy (Delegate District) 1, Berkeley 1 Roane 1, Putnam 1, Pocahontas and Webster (Delegate District) 1-10.

To the Senate twelve members have in been elected, eleven to succeed those whose irm has expired, and one to fill a vacancy in the Tenth District. The proscriptives carry the Second, Third, Fourth, Tenth and probably the Ninth, electing six Senators. Liberals have been chosen for the Fifth, Sixth Eighth and Eleventh, four Senators, The Democrats carry the First and Seventh. So that as between the proscriptives on the side, and the liberals and Democrats on the other, the new members are evenly divided upon the "let up" policy. Two Democrats

and eight Republicans hold over, but as it is understood that several of the Republicans holding over, are avowdly in favor of repealing our disfranchising laws, there is ample eason for the hope that the Senate will meet the House half-way upon questions of reform. The unexpected but emphatic expression of the popular will just had throughout the State will certainly have its weight in the minds of all faithful representatives, and hence we cherish the belief that the next Legislature

will do its full duty in the way of thoroughly

cious abuse of the Registration law of which the annals of party crime can afford no parallel. In no part of this Republic is there a more intelligent, refined, educated and high spirited people than compose the population of the county of Jefferson ; and that they should for the last five years have submitte to the infamous proceedings of the Underdonk's and Turner's of that county, is past comprehension. Will Governor Stevenson further tolerate these crimes against the liberties of his fellow-citizens, and against the laws and constitution of his State? Will he make himself the further instrument of the perpetration of these enormities? Will the Legislature continue in the hands of the Executive, a power liable to such abuses ? Is it the policy and purpose of Governor Stevenson by a system of most unparalleled annoyances and oppressions to drive these people into a state of chronic resistance to the State au-

thority? 


