SATURDAY'S NEWS.

A despatch from Paris at midnight of the 1st contains a statement made public by the Ministry regarding the last battles on the

Meuse on the 30th and 31st ult. They admit a retrograde movement on the part of their army the first day; that they suffered sensible losses, but inflicted heavy damage on the Prussians. They (the Prussians), it is added, burned the town of Mouzon and killed most of the inhabitants, and the next day, the 31st, alternate advances and retreats were made by ever issued. It contains European War Picboth sides. The Prussians, after several unsuccessful attempts, at last succeeded in placing themselves on the north side of the Meuse. On the morning of this day Mc-Mahon crossed the Meuse at Mouzon. Everything seemed to indicate that the engagement would be renewed in the same district

The despatch from King william to the Queen of the 1st, three o'clock P. M., speaks of a battle having raged before Sedan from 8:30 A. M., that his forces had advanced victoriously and had driven the enemy almost. entirely into the city. The Bavarian Minister received a despatch at Munich from Beaumont on the 1st, stating that the Prussians were victorious in a battle which had just occurred, and that the French were driven over the Meuse.

The commander of Strasbourg says that, notwithstanding the bombardment, the fortress can and will hold out against any attack. It is positively stated in Paris that communication has been opened between Bazaine and McMahon. From Sedan, it is reported that the Prussians are suffering severe losses from the ravages of sickness. Belgian troops in large force are guarding


