





CHESAPEAKE AND OHIO CANAL .- The damages to the canal by the recent flood were greater than any since the flood of April, 1852, which caused a suspension of navigation for just below Harper's Ferry which required nearly 600 feet of wall and tow path to be put REMEMBER, WE LOST THE STATE up. On the nine mile level, Monocacy Division. there were four breaks, measuring together 630 feet, but none of them more than three feet below bottom. On the eight mile level, below Edwards' Ferry, five breaks-one 250 feet long, washed out sixteen feet below bottom-one 180 feet long, twelve feet below bottom-one 140 feet long eight feet below bot-tom-two on beam side 160 feet in length, but not below bottom. On feeder level three fourths of a mile below Senaca dam, a small break. At Great Falls, a break 80 feet long and about thirty-six feet deep. At Dam No. I, guard bank broken for 300 feet; this bank averages six feet high. Between the seven and five mile posts, two small breaks. The death of General Lee will give occasion at the South for a marked display of public grief. It will be without significance, and may not, perhaps, be thought wholly appropriate; nevertheless it will be a demonstraion in many respects remarkable. It is much to be doubted if any other Government than that of the United States would permit, or any other people than our own would countenance. the open expressions of regret which will be made over the loss of a man who had become prominent in a great conspiracy to destroy the Governmet and divide the people. But not only will the public meetings the official resolutions, the public parades in which the Southern people will express their sorrow be officially ignored, but loyal people will respect their grief. The best loved leader of the South, Lee was not absolutely without honor and even affection in the North; while hot tears flow for him there, a sympathy, not un-allied to pity, will be left for him here. Time has sufficed to give both North and South a better idea of the personal character of this man. It was difficult for us, in the heart of the war fever,' to understand how it was possible that a man could be a traitor to his country and yet strictly honest toward his fellow men. It is still something of a mystery but none will refuse to admit that socially General Lee was above reproach. Though guilty of weak and wicked acts, it cannot be shown that he ever did a mean thing; and it purpose than by nature generous and yielding. His popularity was based on these attributes: and uniform successes in his defensive operations during the first years of the war won him such confidence of his troops as his repeated blunders and failures in his offensive compaigns could not shake. This confidence remained so strongly with him to the end of the war that with his fall at Appomattox the Cause

he had defended fell forever. Now that he is gone, let us endeavor to forget his folly and his great crime, remembering only that he was not wholly bad .--False political principles rather than false morals perverted his mind and wrought his ruin, as they wrought that of his party. To forget is the greatest charity we could now extend him. Yet in the history of his country he must live; not, indeed, as the ablest of her sons who sought her overthrow, but as, in many respects, the least odious and the most prominent: as a General, great only in defensive-passive operations, but there unequaled throughout the war on either sides; as a Soldier, stainless on every point save that on which a Soldier's honor should be the bright-
