CANAL AND RAIL ROAD.

We have been not a little surprised at a charge which has been urged against us, that we are unfriendly to the project of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal. This charge, uttered for political purposes, cannot for a moment be believed by any one who either possesses memory or a disposition to do justice. It has probably arisen from the circumstances, that we have frequently commended the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road, and the noble and enterprising spirit which animated its founders and promoters. We have also been accustomed to have it in our power to witness the progress of the latter, and it has always been our habit to speak well of every improvement connected with the interests of our country. We have not been equally fortunate in the progress of the Canal—because we seldom go except where business calls us. But our feelings and hopes concerning this splendid and useful work have not been less ardent.

If any one will suffer trouble to cast back my thoughts only a few years, he will find that ours was the first voice (or pen) raised in this country in behalf of the Canal. We took up the subject in the year 1821, and urged it most earnestly upon the attention of our readers. Never have we faltered in its support. Indeed, so zealous were we, that some of our friends tried to jocur us for what they termed our "lost labor." But the scheme has progressed. We were present at its commencement, and turned up some of the first earth from its destined bed. Our good wishes have attended it, in its incipiency and its progress, up to this period, and shall accompany it to its final (and we hope) glorious consummation. Doubtless, however, as we have seen, we do not wish to see the Rail Road stopped short of Zanesville. To that point, we always hoped and believed both works could be carried with success and convenience; and then, that an union of means would take place, to continue whatever of them should prove, upon experiment, to be the better of the two, on to the great Ohio.

No one can doubt the immense and adventurous results which will accrue to our country, by the completion of both works to the point we have mentioned; and we would deeply regret that any conflicting interests should interfere to blight the prospects or retard the march of either of them, to the intersection of the great Valley of Virginia.
