The grand monument to the memory of the late Emperor of Russia, ordered by Nicholas his brother, was raised on St. Alexander Nefsky's day, August 30, O. S. 1832, in presence of the imperial family, nobility, citizens and strangers, including an immense multitude, in the large square in front of the Hermitage, or winter palace of the Emperor. The shaft is of red granite, the same substance of which Pompey's pillar is composed, and is represented to be larger than that celebrated shaft. The raising is thus described in the Boston Transcript, by a gentleman recently returned from Russia:

"The pedestal, which is square, is forty feet high; the shaft is round, and in one piece; it is eighty-five feet high and twelve diameter at the top; it weighs six hundred tons. The column supports a colossal bronze statue, representing an angel holding the capital of the column, is thirty-five feet high; and the height of the monument from the ground to the top of the statue is one hundred and sixty-five feet. 
