This important event was the result of a dif-gerence of opinion between the King and M. Thiers at a Cabinet Council held on Thursday morning at Neuilly, on the all-absorbing subject of French Intervention in Spain. The President of the Council, by the late occurrence at Madrid, persisted in urging the ne-cessity of sending a French force into the Peninsula, ostensibly to oppose the Carlists, but in reality to enable the Queen to cast off what she regards as the constitutional yoks.
