---Several extensive mercantile failures have lately occurred in New-York, Philadelphia and New Orleans and the pressure in the money market in those cities, is represented as being very great. The last Baltimore American says -" The expected crisis in the commercial affairs of our country appears to have arrived. To the East and South calamities have occurred in the mercantile world, the onsequences of which cannot at present be fully estimated.
