SWINE.—Carrying out sales were made at \$1.50 per lb., but the price afterwards declined to \$1.40, and \$1.30. Our Hogs are now generally quoted at \$1.50, but butchers would sell for less, and Hams at full sales of \$3.50 small lots at \$3.20. A small lot of North Carolina Ham sold this week at \$2.

POULTRY.—Transactions in every description are on a small scale.

HORNED SHEEP.—The store price is \$5—Retail sales only.—The wigan price is \$3.25.

CITY MILK FLOW.—We quote at \$250.00—\$250.00.

SHARON FLOW.—Limited sales at \$3.

EGG FLOW.—It sold at \$5.00 & 75.

The inspections for this week ended Thursday evening, comprised the following quantities: 6032 barrels, 50 half barrels—besides 200 bushels, 1000 Pounds, and 40 bushels, and 100 bushels Corn Meal.

GRAIN.—Wheat in the early part of the week was quoted at \$1.50. Yesterday sales of very good spring wheat were made at \$1.50, \$1.50, No. 2 wheat at market.

CORN.—Sales of white were made in the early part of the week at 14-15 cents, and yellow at 12 cents. Since then the market has rallied, and sales of white have been made at 16-17 cents, and yellow at 10 cents.
