All these arms are loaded at the breech, and the advantages and defects of each are described in the report. . The Board is confirmed in the opinion that the arm of Hall h entitled to all the favorable consideration which has heretefore been bestowed upon it by previously constituted boards and commissions. The Report details the result of several experiments, and the character of each invention. We take a few extracts in reference to Mr.

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Hall's Guns : "In constrained positions, such as are not uncommon to light troops, the experiments with Hall's Rifles, at Fort Monroe, in 1826, when in the hands of troops, fully prove that this arm is admirably adapted to this service and that of mounted corps, in consequence of the convenience in loading and facility of discharging when on horseback.

"The attainment of simplicity in the construction of fire-arms is unquestionably of the first importance, in order that those who are to use them may readily comprehend their principles and utility. 
