The princiole asserted in them, that the Public lands are the common property of the United States, and that each State possesses its proportionate interest in them. is a sound one, and is in accordance with the rule of strict justice to all the members of the National Confederacy. The public domain is a common property, to he held for the benefit of all, and we trust that the older States, who have as deep an interest in the education of their people as the new ones, will not be backward in pressing their claims to a just distribution of its proceeds:

NO. 48.

Resolved, That each of the United States. The state of the s portinged to the federal population of each or, in the terms of the compact, according to the usual Properties proportions of the general charge and expenditure.

Resolved, That those States, In whose favor Congress has not made appropriations of public domain for the purposes of education, are entitled to such appropriation, as will correspond, in a just proportion, with those heretofore made in behalf of other States.

Resolved. That our Senators and Representatives in the Congress of the Unied States be requested to urge the claims of the State of North Carolina to her portion of the public lands; and that the same, when obtained, be applied to the establishment and support of common schools, and the promotion and diffusion of education throughout the State.


