VIRGINIA LEGISLATURE. - The const. deration of the Report of the Committee on Roads, proposing a general scheme of Internal Improvement, has occupied a prominent place in the proceedings of the House of Delegates luring the last week. Several able speeche were delivered, pro and con, of the subject Mr. STEART, of Augusts, (says the Whig) of Thursday, "made a most able, ingenious, and loguent defence of the plan of improvement, and exhibited in glowing colors the immense advantages to be acquired by the State from the prosecution of an enlarged, liberal, and comprehensive system of improvement."

On Friday, Mr. EDMUNDS, of Fauquier made a long, able, and logenious speech against the improvements recommended in th Report. He instituted an inquiry between the Internal Improvements of New York State and the proposed system for Virginia. The New York Canals, Mr. E. argued, were neceson their banks. No such circumstances ex-

isted in Virginia. In Pennsylvania also, her improvements were of similar palpable necessity, and instantaneous demand and utility, but it was not so in Virginia. The present erisis of universal ruin and bankrustev which how overspread the country, was hot, Mr. E. thought, a favourable time to bring forward such a plan as this. An increase of taxation he thought would be the result, because no reliance for funds could or ought to be placed on the Surplus Fund, as it was certainly loan, and not a donation.

Mr. E. examined the accounts, and cor mented upon the proceeds and profits of different Rarl-Roads in existence, arguing from he whole, that these Rail-Roads, if made in Virginia, would never pay-would never support themselves-and would become chargesole to the State, or else must be abandoned and left to rot.


