"No person shall, within the jurisdiction of the United States, purchase or progere, collect, transport, or have in possession, any vessel, vehicle, arms or munitions of war; or collect, or employ, or embody, or train men, with intent to the use or employment of the same in exciting, aiding, or carrying on, or to be used in any insurrection or rebellion against the territory or dominion of any foreign Power, or State, or Colony, or People, conterminous with the United which the United States are at peace; and every person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be fined not exceeding three thousand dollars, and be mprisoned not exceeding three years."


