There was no surety that such stocks would bring their par cash value, because there was no surety that the buyer would receive his cost for the stock bought when the payment was due. Mr-Wessten continued his remarks, and said that the chairman of the Committee of Finance makes an acknowledgment of a fact which is certainly without a parallel in the history of the Government, either in war or in peace. We have never had such a condition of things before, and the condition of the Treasury is such as certainly to demand the action of the Congress. If the Senate could not originate any other measure than this for the relief of the Treasury, it still would be requisite for the House to act upon this measure. The House had power to originate all measures of revenue, and we gain nothing by early action upon such a measure as this. 
