VERMONT SENATOR. — The Hon. Samuel S. Phelps, of Middlebury, has been elected a **Senator in Congress by the Legislature of the State of Vermont for the term of six years from the fourth of March next, in place of Hon. Benjamin Smith, whose term of service will then expire. Mr. Phelps was chosen by the House of Representatives, and his name was carried by a unanimous vote.—*Phelps 107; Allen 2; Kellogg, (V.) 11; T. 76.* In the Senate, the vote stood for Phelps 14—all others, 12. Mr. P. is now one of the assistant justices of the Supreme Court.**

A VIEW OF THE BATTLE FIELD.

Now that the smoke and bustle of the recent political contests have passed away, it may be proper for us to take a view of the "Battle-field," to ascertain what the Whigs, in both parties, who seem to have lost their latitude in the storm and commotion of the political elements may be right and intelligent, equally with their real and relative position.
