HARPERS-PEERY SCENERY.

I would advise visitors who generally pass through Harpers-Perry during the autumnal months, and who are fond of the sublime, romantic, and picturesque scenery of our country, to carry out one of the most delightful little villages—Harpers-Perry, the most beautiful little village, so variegated in the appearance of its mountain verdure, that when contrasted with the gray rock mingled among the many-coloured forest foliage, it has the most happy and pleasing effect which the imagination can possibly picture to the mind.

Independent, however, of its natural advantages to interest the visitor, there is here a *local history* for the filtration of small arms, consisting of *Musket* and *Pistol* *Rifle* establishments.
