public expenditures which are worthy of especial note. The tables of figures speifying the various accounts of expendiures under the several heads enumerated are taken from the public documents and believed to be of undoubted accuracy. We give the results of some of those aggregates without annexing the items, which may be seen in the published copy of the speech.


