The Empire State.

She too has cast off her son, as no longer worthy of her parental regard! This is the unkindest cut of all! When before was there ever such a marked report administered to a wayward and disobedient child? When before was there ever such a cutting rebuke given by a mother to her own child? What surprise there to be at others refusing to take him into their embrace, when his own parent did not countenance him!

Returns from the whole State have been received, and Gen. Garrison's majority is more than

12,000!

In 1830, the State of New York, desirous to do honor to one of her citizens, gave Martin Van Buren her Electoral votes by a majority of twenty-eight thousand two hundred and seventy-two! After a period of four years, during which he has been at the head of the nation, the people of his native State have again been called upon to give him their confidence as a support; and the result is that he has been declared unworthy of his station, and enemy to the welfare of the Republic, a majority of more than ten thousand of the very people who only four years ago gave him a majority of 23,072!! The advocates of corrupt and unprincipled politicians, and demagogues who dare to stand up for the rights of the people, bear in mind this rebuke of a powerful and unscrupulous high public functionary. The history of the United States records no such instance of an honest public servant being thus severely punished by his fellow citizens.

The vote of New York (says the Baltimore Patriot) is an eloquent lesson to all the men, and comes as a powerful warning to all who would sacrifice right for expediency, or sink the character of the enlightened statesman, in the growing purposes, striving for a spoilt. For fifty years, during which I present form of government has existed, this is the first instance, in which a candidate for the Presidency, whose record as a statesman, failed to obtain a vote of his own State! In a judgment upon his measures, such as this, there can be no mistake. From such a condemnation, there can be no appeal. As it is the first instance of such condemnation, reluctantly, but decisive—let us hope, by the last which evil counseled a bad government may render necessary. Let us hope that a parent State will not again be constrained to render judgment upon a recreant son, and that the cause of Mr. Van Buren, the head of the administration of 1840, will live in the memory of aspiring politicians, as an example to deter.

OHIO.

Returns from nearly all the State have been received. There is a large Harrison gain in every county, comparing the vote with Corwin's, at the last election for Governor. Gen. Harrison's majority in Ohio will be about

25,000.

Gen. Harrison's majority (Hamilton) has given a majority for him.

INDIANA.

Great as was the Whig majority in August, Harrison's will be greater. In several counties heard from, etc., he has gained over three thousand, surpassing the result with those in Indiana. Harrison's majority in Indiana will be more than ten thousand.

RHODE ISLAND.

This gallant little State has gone for Harrison and Tyler by a majority of 2,005 in a vote of 8,500.

KENTUCKY.

Harrison is sweeping the State. The Lexington Intelligencer thinks his majority will be 25,000 in the State.

CONNECTICUT.

The complete returns show a majority of 6,121 for Harrison and Tyler. This is one of the States which have deserted Mr. Fillmore.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

The Portsmouth Journal gives the complete returns, which show Van Buren's majority to be 6,430—which is 6,000 up. The majority he received in that State is 1,500.

THE FUTURE.

It is now clear that the Whigs, who have so far been successful, will be beaten in the election of 1844. The Whig party has been discredited by the exposure of its corruption and unprincipled character. The Whigs have been beaten in every State, and the Whig party is dead.
