MR. CLAY AND MR. CALHOUN. The Washington correspondent of the Philadelphiz U. S. Gazette says-

An anecdote is told of the meeting of Mr. Clay and Mr. Calhoun after the former retired from the Senate, which shows that political strife, though it may for a while deaden the finer feelings of the heart, cannot destroy them, especially in those hearts that beat with generous and manly sensibilities. As Mr. Clay was passing towards the door to leave the Senate Chamber, Mr. Calhoun met him-they had not spoken to each other for five years; but they now simultaneously extended their bands, and rushed to each other's arms; neither spoke, but both wept. At length Mr. Clay said, on parting, "give my best regards to Mrs. Cal-How much more noble was this houn." reconciliation and parting, than if they had separated looking defiance at each other !
