

They will not be misled by the silly cry that the Bank is a Federal measure. A CHEAP PAINT Take one bushel of unslacked lime, and slack it with cold water; when well elacked, add to it 20 lbs. of sugar. Strain this mixture through a wire sieve and it will be fit for use after reducing it with cold water. This is intended for the outside of buildings, where it is exposed to the weather. In order to give a good color, three coals are necessary on brick, and two on wood. It may be laid on with a whitewash brush. Each coat must have cufficient time to dry before, the next is applied.—For painting inside walls, take.

The following is the price of some of the artias before, one bushel of unslacked lime, 3 cles, and every thing else is in proportion : lbs. of sugar, 5 lbs. of ealt, and prepare as above, and apply with a brush. It is well calculated to preserve brick walls; and is for preferable to oil paint. This paint will preserve rough boards much longer than they would be from dressing them and covering them with oil paint. You can make any color you please. For straw color, use yellow ochre iastead of whiting, for lemon color, other and chrome yellow; for lead and state color, lampblack; for blue, indigo; for green, chrome green. These different kinds of piants will not cost one-fourth as much as oil paints, including the putting on.

A BRILLIANT WHITEWASH. Many have heard of the brilliot stucco whitewash on the east side of the President's house at Washington. The following is a receipt for making it, with some additional improvement obtained from experience. Take a half bushel of ter, covering it during the process, to keep in the steam. Strain the liquid through a fine seive or strainer, and add to it a peck of sait, previously well dissolved in warm water, three pounds of ground rice boiled to a thin paste, and stirred in boiling hot, half a pound of powdered Spanish whiting, and a pound of clean glue, first soaking it well and 7-8 Lonsdale Shirting 8-4-4 do. Long Island 10 small kettle, within a large one, filled with water. Add five gallons of hot water to the whole mixture; stir it well, and let it stand a few days, covered from dirt. It should be put on quite hot. For this purpose, it can be kept in a kettle on a portable furnace. When walls have been badly smoked and you wish to have then a clear white, it is well to squeeze indigo plentifully through a bag in the water you use, before it is stirred in the whole mixture. If a larger quantity than five gallons is wanted, the same proportions should be ob-
