The New Orleans Bee of the 8th has the following information respecting the result of the late election :

THE ELECTION.

Since our last we have reserved returns from East and West Baton Rouge, the Concordia district, and several of the strong locofoeo parishes in the Fourth Corgressional District. The complexion of these returns is such as to satisfy us beyond reasonable doubt, that the Whigs have carried a MAJORITY of the Legislature, but leave the result in the Fourth of the Legislature, but leave the result in the Fourth District for Congress yet uncertain—the contest be-tween Bongnetox and Monse having evidently been close and severe. There is a gain of some 150 for the whigs in the parishes heard from, and Monas's present majority is 330, with De Soto, Sabine and one or two other locofoco parishes, and the Opelousus and Attakapss counties (W.) to be heard from. 


