THE DISEASES OF WHITEAT. In his excellent Report, 23 Commisioner of Patents, Mr. Ellworth alludes to the methods of preventing the diseases and attacks to which the wheat crop is exposed. He says that the time when the field is struck with rust, seems to be just at the time of ripening. A remarkable fact entire on this subject is stated in a report to the New Jersey Agricultural Society. An extraordinary field of wheat, supposed to be out of danger, on a hot day became drenched by a sudden shower, which came on between one and three o'clock, p. m. All was still; on the passing away of the shower the sun came out intensely hot. Theowner went into his field to examine his wheat, which he found much pressed down by the shower: he immediately perceived a continued ticking, or snapping noise, in every direction. The straw was fine and bright; but, on examining it, he found it bursting in short slits one quarter of an inch long, and
