The Bowling Green is full of similar materials, while forty or fifty poor families are trying to dress themselves, wash ing their faces in the Foundain and hushing the cries of their children.

In the Battery there are acres upon a cres of household goods scattered upon the grass-each little pile attended by the out-driven family. Such a scene has never been dreamed or imagined.

The glare of the conflagration lies thick and ruddy upon the Bay, and the red light of the new risen sun mingles ghastly with the redder and brighter hue of the flames. The whole city seems pouring into this fiery and hissing funnel. in a steady stream.

A man was carried off by two firemen. belonging to No. 15, who had become deranged from his sister being burnt to death and the loss of all his property.




