# THE POST OFFICE LAW.

There have been several very important changes made in the Post Office Law by Congress. It is made illegal to deposit two letters in the same envelope or package directed to different persons. The penalty is \$10, one half to the informer. There is, however, a proviso that the law shall not apply to packages sent to foreign countries.

Newspapers not sent from the office of publication, are to be charged with three cents postage. So also all hand bills and

The Post Master is authorized to estabish branch Post Offices in any city where the convenience of the inhabitants may make it desirable, and that with.

The Post routes are extended to Oregon and to Mexico, with return mails .-During the war and for three months after, the officers and soldiers of the Army are to receive their letters and newspapers free of postage.


