tablishments, in the New York worrespondence of the Charleston Courie Notwith gooding the many newspaper sibures which we have witnessed in this ci'v, the value of well established newapaper property is very great. .. We had a iew years ago, a prevailing mania for types and paper, which, while it jasted, used up considerable amount of float cash ! It went out a few years ago, and the last new daily paper establishment was, I hink, the Telegraph, which lived about two years. This maria has now run into Sunday publishing, there being now five or six Sunday papers. Atlas, Mercusy and Times, are doing well—the Atlas probably divides \$40 per week to each of its proprietors, and the Mercury nearly as much. But I was led to speak of the value of newspaper property, by hearing of the sale of one half of the Boston Atlas, by Mr. Hayden, to Col. Schouler, of the Lowel Courier, for about \$35,000; The Atlas is one of the best-papers in Boston. and is liberally patronized, but probably the sacst profitable paper is the Daily Advertiser, which has a very large advertise ing patronages, It is considered worth \$90,000 and \$40,000 it is said bas been refused for half of it.
