BRIEF MEMOIR OF GEN. TAYLOR .-Zachary Taylor was born in the county of Orange in Virginia. He removed to Kentucky in early life with his father. In 1808 he received a commission from President Jefferson, of a Lieutenancy in the 7th infantry. He soon after became a cap-

In 1812, while in the command of Fort Harrison, with but a handful of men, he was attacked by a force of 450 Indians, whom he repelled in the most gallant and soldierly manner. In the Black Hawk war of 1832, Taylor, now a Lieut. Colonel, was assigned the command of the reg-ular troops of Gen. Atkinson's army. In 1837 he was ordered with his regiment to Florida, where he served with distinction, and showed himself a faithful, efficient officer. He received the brevet of brigadiergeneral in consequence. On the 28th of May, 1845, he was ordered by the Secretary of War to hold his troops in readiness to move into Texas to repel invasion either of the Mexicans or Indians. The Mexican war followed; and the battles of Palo Alto, Resaca de la Palma, Monterey and Buena Vista, made Taylor the most noted man of the war.
