In noticing the wells of ancient Italy, we may refer to a circumstance, which although trivil I in itself, led to the most surprising dis-

covery that he ever taken place on this globe, and one which in the interest it has excited is unexampled. In the early part of the eighteenth century, 1711, an Italian peasant, while digging a well near his cottage, found some fragments of a colored marble. These attracting attention, led to farther exeavation, when a statue of Hercules was disinterred, and shortly afterwards a mutilated one of Cleopatra. These specimens of ancient art were found at a considerable depth below the heap, inquired of the captain what should be proved to be a temple situated in the centre

of the ancient city of Herculaneum! This city was overwhelmed with ashes and lava, curing an eruption of Vesuvius, A. D. 79, being the same in which the elder I'liny perished who was sufficeated with sulphurous vapors, like Lot's wife in a similar calamity. Herculaneum, therefore, had been buried i, 630 years! and while every memorial of it was lost, and even the site unknown, it was thus suddenly, by a resurrection then unpaand the appetites of all did justice to the fare; ralleled in the annals of the world, brought again to light; and streets, temples, houses, statues, paintings, jewelery, professional implements, kitchen utensils, and other articles connected with ancient domestic life, were to such a stew to-morrow? The first broke out in Murrhy's stage establishment, on the corner of 27th street and Third avenue, and destroyed one hundred and fifty horses, twenty-six stages, twentyfive sleighs, a factory attached, a Methodist Church on twenty-seventh street. Public School No. 15, several small dwelling houses, two good frame dwellings, and St. Barnabas Protestant Episcopal Church. The whole loss will not fall much short of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Mr. Murphy's loss is fifty thousand dollars, only twenty-five hundred of which were insured. 
