MUCK.

Although there has been much written on the application of muck as a manure, I think the subject has not been exhausted, nor will It be, I apprehend, until every farmer who has a muck swamp upon his premises, or can obtain access to one in his vicinity, is led duly to appreciate its value. I know of no grain or root crop upon and dry soil that may not be benefitted by its judicious application, and that too to such an extent, as to prove a source of great benefit to the farmer. Muck, when the first dug from the swamp, is not in fit condition to be applied as a renovator to the soil; it is composed of particles of vegetable matter that have been accumulating for centuries, and kept by their compactness and immersion in water, from the influence of the atmosphere; and it has to be thrown up into heaps, and accordingly "overhauled," to bring it to the action of the air, in order to render it fit for use; or if wanted soon for use, unslacked lime placed in the heap will facilitate the process of fermentation. 
