The Hon. Joseph Johnson, the Democratic candidate for Governor, commenced his political career in 1823, by an election to Congress from the Clarksburg District over Mr. Doddridge, Judge Duncan, and another gentleman. sippi, and Louisians. Again in February, 1825, in the election of Representatives, Mr. Johnson alone of the whole Virginia delegation voted for Gen. Jackson, not, however, as his choice, but in deference, as he said afterwards, to public opinion in his District. In that contest, Wm. H. Crawford was the caucus Republican candidate for the Presidency, and the favorite of Virginia. The popular vote stood 8489 for Crawford, 3189 for Adams, 2861 for Jackson, and 416 for Clay. In the six counties which composed Mr. Johnson's District, Crawford received 81 votes, Acams

84, Jac' en 231, and Clay 315. In the election before the people, Mr. Johnson was the warm supporter of Henry Clay, with whose political weeks he generally coincided, but did not have an opportunity to vote for him in his representative capacity because Mr. Clay did not receive a sufficient number of electoral votes to carry him before the House of Representatives.

Mr. Johnson was re-elected to Congress in 1825 as a Tariff and Internal Improvement man, as his printed circular of that day will prove. Philip Doddridge was his

competitor. In 1827 he again presented himself as a candidate for the suffrages of the people of his District, but was defeated by Isaac Leffler, of Ohio County, whose majority was 427 votes. 
