KOSSUTH'S VISIT TO BALTIMORE. The visit of Kossuth to this city, (says the Balti-

more American of Saturday.) which will take place to-day, will be hailed, we doubt not, with a most cordial welcome. The interest which attaches to the man, both personally and as the representative of a cause, is peculiarly enhanced by a captivating eloquence which seems never at fault. The history of his life is like a romance-yet full of stera realities. His appeals to the American people are us bold as they are touching; they carry with them an aspect almost of audacity. Yet everything may be pardoned in a man who loves his country and forgets himself in her cause.

The frankness with which Kossuth arows his purposes deserves a reciprocity of candor. As an lo these shores; as a man who had done and suffered much in the cause of his nation's independence, exhibiting in his eareer great patriotism and remarkable endowments, he was invited, together with his associates in captivity, to come to the Unite! States, and a national vessel was sent to bring them if it should be their wish to come. Some of his fellow-countrymen, escaping from the wreck of their nation's hopes, had found their way to this Western world before him, and were content to enjoy liberty here, where it exists without needing the support of the bayonet or sacrifi es of blood. But Kossuth came not for a residence, but upon a mission. The restoration of Hungarian nationality is the passion of his life; he is thoroughly devoted to it, and he makes no concealment of the fact that with him everything else is of subordinate consid-We may admire this devotion. It has in it some-

thing heroic. It sits gracefully upon Kossuth .-His heartfelt utterances, blending the sentiment of patriotism with a glowing eloquence, find a responsive sympathy in the bosoms of his hearers, and cause at times an enthusiasm indicative of the power of the highest kind of oratory. Throughout all this excitement, however, a line of discrimination runs. It cannot be forgotten that Kossuth proposes to us war, now and henceforth-war for the quarrels of others-war to keep Europe in equilibrium-war to establish and maintain republicanism where it cannot sust in itself-war to force upon such a subject. Garibaldi fought for Italian freedom and showed himself to be a hero; yet Garibaldi, in New York, never dreamed of appealing Our venerable friend and predecessor, Richard to the American people to take up arms against French intervention in Rome. His claim was as good as any that Kossuth can urge; and if we Hangary we shall be bound to intervene to keep France out of Itatly. Where is intervention to end !

Since that time they have made a standing annual appropriation of \$5,000 for the purchase of new books. Independent of this, the collection has been greatly enriched by various and munificent contributions from private sources .-The entire Library of which the Jefferson formed the nucleus contained in the main room was destroyed. It consisted of 60,000 volumes. The books in an adjoining room including the Law Library, comprising 20,000 volumes were saved. Many fine busts and paintings not included in the above were also lost, it is a great and almost irreparable loss to the nation. An investigation of the premises has been made and resulted in the conviction that the cause of the fire was the heated state of the flue which passes near the Library. #### TERRIBLE CONFLAGRATION IN PHIL-ADELPHIA.

GREAT DESTRUCTION OF LIFE AND PROPERTY .-One of the most destructive fires that has ever visited Philadelphia, occurred at an early hour or Saturday morning.

About one o'clock flames were seen issning from Hart's building, at the corner of Chesnut and Sixth streets, which was speedily destroyed, together with several book and musical stores, and Harper's Res taurant in the basement. The flames next communicated to the Shakspeare nilding, on the opposite side of Sixth street, ad-

joining the Chesnut street Theatre, which was totally sonsumed. Brown's Hotel, on Chesnut street adjoining Hart's building, shared the same fate. 
