TAXATION AND PINANCE. 22. Taxation shall be equal and uniform throng out the commonwealth, and all property other tha slaves shall be taxed in proportion to its value which shall be ascertained in such manner as ma

23. Every s'ave who has attained the age of 12 ears shall be assessed with a tax equal to and not exceeding that assessed on land of the value of the undred dollars. Slaves under that age shall not to taxation; and other taxable property apted from taxation by the vote of a majority of the whole number of members elected o each House of the General Assembly.

24. A capitation tax, equal to the tax assessed on land of the value of two hundred dollars, shall be levied on every white male inhabitant who has attained the age of twenty-one years; and one equamoity of the capitation tax upon white persons shall be applied to the purposes of education in primary and free schools; but nothing herein contained shall prevent exemptions of taxable polls in cases of bodily infirmity

25. 
