The fame of his prowess provoked the vain jealousy of others He had acquired the perilous reputation of a matchless hero-the the grove, speechless, almost terrified with ardent, the desperate, the ambitious would win his laurels Every young Hercules longed to kill the lion, so as to clothe himself in the skin, and thus was Borland forced to maintain an interminable war. It is so in all professions. There can be no peace in high places-storm, bail, and thunder must break around the mountain's brow. The duelist was one of the earliest settlers in Eastern Texas, where he became the chief of the Lynching party. In his own county of Harrison he possessed boundless influence; ind ed he would not suffer a foe to reside within its lim ts. Hence, he might have openly defied the law, had such been his pleasure; but his shrewd and farseeing sagacity adopted a wiser and safer course. After perpetrating any homicide he invariably submitted his own case to the grand jury, sure of a triamphant acquittal by his friends on trial; and thus, should public sentiment ever turn against him in future, he would be enabled to plead effectual verdicts in bar of all past offences. At length the time arrived which the Colonel had so long anticipated. A wealthy and intelligent class of citizens began to change the current of opinion in Harrison, so that in the county election the friends of order, by a slight majority, gained their candidate for Sheriff. This was a terrible blow to the Lynchers, as it deprived them of their secure vantage-ground in packing juries, and to increase their danger, at this unpropitious crisis, a new judge was appointed. The old faction, however, did not despair. They were still numerous, thoroughly armed, and desperadoes to a man, and determined at the first court to master all their strength, so as to

control and overawe their proceedings. At nine o'clock in the morning of the second Monday in September, 1842, the new judge took his seat on the bench. He was a stranger from the West, whose name alone had transpired, and whose appearance at Ah! surely this must be the last of all !



The distinguished nominee of the Staunton Convention as come and gone, spoken and been heard ; and all that ives after him here, is the general distress felt for his ad, pale, and dejected appearance, and the memory of that speech, which the practice of "forty odd occasions and a hundred and ninety odd hours" has failed to make perfect. Truly have the people of Jefferson been unfortunate ! This sword is of exquisite finish-being a straight rapier with the highest polished steel hilt, and now in a most beautiful state of preservation ; in fact, it has the appearance of being perfectly new, it having been always kept with particular care. Also, two levels. one used during the Revolutionary War as a gunner's level, the other for adjusting the surveyor's case, scales, protractors, &c., complete. A shagreen case containing all the protracting instruments, in very fine order, and two surveyor's chains, together with the wooden pins used with the same. It is certain that these interesting relics have been preserved with great care by those who

have possessed them, and we feel assured that they are now in hands where they are fully appreciated and will be well taken care of 'til the next generation shall claim their keeping. These instruments were used by Gen. WASHINGTON in 1719, when he was 17 years of age. They were carefully preserved by the General, and at his death in 1799. they descended to his oldest nephew and executor Col. WILLIAM AUGUSTINE WASHINGTON, of Havwood, Westmoreland County, Va., at whose dea h in 1826, they descended to his son, Col GEORGE C. WASHINGTON, of Maryland, by whom they were presented, February 10, 1854, to his son, Lewis W. WASHINGTON, of "Beall Air," Jefferson County. Va. "These relies have been in Maryland

since 1810, and are again restored to Virginia. where their first polish was worn off 106 years since. They certainly must be looked upon as the most interesting mementos connected with the early history of Wassungron.
