CURIOUS MACHINE. A funny cotemporary describes a new motive power that has been attached to his press, and boasts of its ingenuity and ca-pacity. We, too, have a curious machine of strange construction for propelling our printing apparatus. It is an imported article or rather of foreign origin—hailing, we believe, from Africa. It does not occupy much space, only about 24 lighter; and reste upon space, only about 24 inches; and rests upon two pillers, very much, resembling human legs, which the bottom are expanded into large supporters, which being produced at right angles with the uprights, serve to keep them steady. Above these branches the remainder of the machine bears, no inapt resemblance externally to the upper part of the human form and internally it is furthe human form and internally it. is furnished with such arrangements as are necessary to generate power, which is applied to the driving wheel by means of two lateral crank-like attachments, hinged on the upper part of the frame, and looking out, not unlike arms. Above this point is fixed a kind of round oblong arrangement, connected with the machinery below by pipes through which the fuel, water and air, necessary for working the machinery is conducted. In the face of this arrangement is an opening for some six inches in length, elliptical in form, which receives with wonderful facility the fuel, consisting of prepared animal or regetable substances, and also liquids infus ed with hops and rye-the manufacture of which is extensively carried on by Messrs.
Stearns & Brummell. This crifice might on casual observation be taken for a human mouth. The cost of keeping and working the machine is only about five or six dollars per week, which is a great saving on the exense of the uspal steam engine.
