MR. BUCHANAN ON THE PACIFIC

It will be seen (says the Baltimore Amer ican) from Mr. Buchanan's letter to the Chairman of the Democratic Central Committee of California, that the President elect has definitely committed himself in favor of the constitutional power of the government to construct a railroad to the Pacific. He derives the authority of the government to do this from its "power to declare war" and its constitutional power "to repel invasions." Strict constructionists may find some difficulty in following Mr. Buchanan in his conclusions, but as the work to be accomplished is one involving the highest and most important interests of the country, and not likely to be achieved in the present ago without the powerful aid of the government, t will be generally acceptable. The Domocratic and Republican parties are now both committed to the project of a Pacific railroad, and the subject will probably be one of the most important to come before Congress at its approaching session.

[From the San Francisco Journal, of Oct. 17.] MR. BUCHANAN ON THE PACIFIC RAIL ROAD QUESTION.

WHEATLAND, (near Lancaster, Pa.,) September 17th, 1856—To B. F. Warkington, Erg., Chairman of the Democratic Blate Central Committee of California—Bir: I have received numerous communications from sources if California entitled to high regard, in reference to the proposed Pacific Railroad. As it would be impossible for me to answer them all, I deem it most proper and respectful to address you a general answer in your official capacity. In performing this duty to the citizens of California, I act in perfect consistency with the self imposed restriction contained in my letter accepting the nomination for the Presidency, not to answer interrogations raising new and different issues from those presented by the Clincinati Convention, because that Convention has itself adopted a resolution in favor of this great work.

I then desire to state, briefly, that concurring I then desire to state, briefly, that concurring with the Convention, I am decidedly favorable to the construction of the Pacific Railroad; and I derive the authority to do this from the constitutional power "to declare war" and the constitutional power "to declare war" and the constitutional greas possesses the same power to make appropriations for the construction of this road, strictly for the purpose of national defence, that it has to erect fortifications at the mouth of the harbor of San Francisco. Indeed, the necessity, with a view to repel foreign invasion from Calfornia, is as great in one case as in the other. Neither will there be danger from the precedent, for it is almost impossible to concrive that any case attended by such extraordinary and unprecedented circumstances can ever again occur'in our history.
