SENATOR HALE PROPERLY RE-

We have already noticed the unbandsome nanper in which the Rev. S. H. Tyng die turbed the ashes of his dead son, Rev. D. . Tyng. by continuing to parade the political anti-playery sentiments of one of his ser mons which lost him his clarical position in Philadelphia -- Senator Hale, who is always. seeking to make mischief when anti-slavery is involved, beard the sermon of Rev. Mr. Cummins at Washington, which, while speak. ing very highly of the merits of the deceased Rev. D. A. Tyng, contained the following expression : -

"He was net perfect. He committed one error—one deep, grave, awful error. He introduced a political question into his pulpit. He did it but once, and, although nearly three years of his ministry have slapsed since that time, it was never repeated, and I firmly believe that he corneaty and deeply repented of this error."

Hale wrote to Rev. S. H. Tyng to know Shether his late one, either directly or indirectly, manifested or expressed any regret for, or repentance of the course be so manfully assumed, and, as his admirers have supposed, so firmly and faithfully sustained till death.

Ber & De Dyng replies "There is not the slightest foundation in truth for the statement that my son, in any way or shape, ever retracted, qualified; or designed to do so, his solemn and well considered protest against the oppression of slavery.'

This correspondence calls out Rev. Mr. Cummins, who, through the "National Intelligeneer "denies the statement of Senator Hale, that he had represented the position the late Rev. D. A. Tyng took on the slavery question, as the great error of his life. What e did say was, that, Mr Tyng had committed a grave and most serious error in bri-ging the discussian of a political subject into the pullit. And in the same sermon, it seems, Rev. Dr. Cummins added, what Mr. Hale forgot to state, that, in his judgment, the great enemy of the Gospel had never levised a more successful mode of retarding the progress of the Gospel in this land, than the attempt of ministers of religion, and hurches and religious societies, to interfere in the heated strife of the polities of the day. Dr. Cummins then defines, as follows, the positions of the Episcopal Church at large,

in regard to political discussion : "The great principle advanced in that sermon is one which, in my judgement, is one especial glory of the Protestant Episcopal church in this country, viz: that hes sphere of duty as a Church of Christ is solely con-fined to matter purely spiritual and religious. This principle has been sanctioned by the almost unanimous practice of her bishops and clergy through all the history of the

church in this country, and in every part of the land-North, South, East and West.-The Episcopal charen ages are all top-isters and members to think alike on any top-The Episcopal church does not ask her minic. Doubtless, there are pro slavery and anti-slavery men within her pale; but, as far as my knowledge goes, the late Mr. Tyng was the first to discuss this exciting subject in an Episcopal pulpit. They are acting under ordinary instructions on that subject. Immediately on bearing of the recent incidents in the Gulf, and before receiving official intelligence, the Admiral dispatched a special steamer, the "Devasta" tion," to pursuit of the "Styn" to require report of her proceedings.
