The following article from the Balt. Patriot presents a true picture of the struggle now going on.

THE WAR OF THE SECTIONS -The WAT DOW being waged between the Buchanan and the Douglas wings of the Democracy is attracting attention. The two great leaders who give names to their respective acctions, are in the field in person, each encouraging his serried masses, and cach apparently confident of victory It is this fact which gives so much interest to the conflict. Both are experienced and adroit tacticians, both are possessed of a sort of bull-dog obstinacy, both have untiring persoverence, both have skillful lieutenants, and both appear to be animated by a bitter hatred towards each other, which nothing less than the overthrow of his autagonist and rival can satisfy.

The Union, the organ and mouth piece of Mr. Buchanan, has been especially raneorous towards "the Douglas faction" for sever al days past, and pours broadside after broad side into Douglas and "the Douglas faction" of hot shot, which cannot but have a damaging effect upon "the little giant" and his "faction" or followers. Indeed the effect is visible upon the one gun battery, called "The States," in Washington, as its one gun-and that of entirely too small a calibre-has been nearly silenced, being wholly unable to reply effectually to the many gun battery of Mr.

Buchanan, which throws much heavier balls. Metaphor aside, it is amusing to observe how pertinaciously The States pretends to believe that The Union does not speak for Mr. Buchapan and his Cabinet, when it certainly must know, for every body else does that Mr. Buchapan himself is the active spirit that gives life, and force, and energy to the battle that is now being waged upon what the Union, or the President through it, denominates, in derision, "the Douglas faction,"-Including, we suppose, our worthy fellow-citizen, Mr. Johnson. The States cays, "If the Union were really what it has e impudence to call itself - but which, happily for the Democratic party, it to far from being -the organ of the President, its malig. nant treachery would go far to break up the party organization and defeat every leading measure of the administration."

Now this is all subterfuge. The States knows that the Union is the organ of Mr. Bucharan , why, then, does it not aim its guns at him! The States may kill off a thou cand Wendell's and gain nothing by the ex ploit whatever ; but if it will throw away its shotgno, with which it has been firing small shot at small game, bring a few blg gune, loaded with beavy balls, to bear upon the head and front of the battle, it may do something effective. Is it afraid to declare war upon the President ! Surely it need not entertain any such fear now, for it has already incurred the penalty of treason. and can never hope for pardon. It is in blood already stepped so far, that to retreat were as dangerous as to go o'er

"The Douglas faction" are in a condition somewhat similar that our Revolutionary beroes were in when they were resisting the power of England meeting her upon the field of battle, but nevertheless, professing to be "most loyal and dutiful subjects" of the king. But they soon saw the false position they were in, and got out of it by declaring themselves "free and independent. "The Douglas faction" must do the same, or be content to be denounced as renegades. and traitors, and to be punished as such should the Administration faction triumph over them.

The Union pretty distinctly gives the demooracy to understand that sympathy for Douglas is treachery to Buchanen, and that he who gives "aid and comfort" to the former, cannot expect them from the latter.

ALEX. R. BOTELER, Esq., delivered the first ddress, welcoming the guests to a participa tion in the festivities of the day. His remarks were eloquent and appropriate, and his allusions to the historic reminiscences of "Mor gan's Spring," were peculiarly touching and happy. He spoke of those who had assembled at that spot in 1775, and of the gallant band of patriots who formed themselves to gether, to march to the aid of Washington of the gallant commander of that band of patriots, the memorable Stevenson; of Daniel and Henry Bedinger, and Peter Lauck, and others, who constituted the first company of soldiers formed South of the Potomac, to march to the defence of Boston; of the deep feeling and enthusiasm of Washington when he learned that recruits had come to join him from the right bank of the l'otomso; he spoke of his own intimate acquaintance with some of the actors in those "times that tried men's souls," and of being present when, after the lapse of half a century, the only surviving members (three in number) of the one hundred that formed Stevenson's company, met their comrades, consecrated themselves to lib erty and their country. To attempt a further description of Mr. Boteler's remarks would only do injustice to his beautiful address, and we consequently leave to the imagination of our readers, the task of forming an adequate estimate of the fervor and pathos of his admirable speech.

Hon. C. J. FAULKNER next addressed the saemblage. We flud it impossible to give ore than a brief synopsis of his remarks :-After some preliminary remarks, beasil that the military spirit was essential to th berties and independence of any people. By se term, he did not mean a spirit of aggresion upon the rights of others, or a thust of foreign dominion and conquest, but that quality in a nation which rendered it sensitive to very invasion of its rights; which would lead t to ask nothing but what is right and aubmit to nothing that was wrong; which caused I to value its own country and its own institutions, and to be prompt at a moment's notice to organize itself into action to repel the for eign invader and to crush the domestic cnenies of its peace. Military spirit in that sense

was the shield of our liberties and independence—the guardian of our national honor. He was not aware of any occasion in the istory of this country when there was any deficiency of military spirit. Not certainly in our Revolutionary struggle, not in the war of 1812-'13, not in the late Mexican war, in which upwards of 70,000 volunteers were mustered into the service of the U. States, and more than 200,000 had tendered their services, which were declined by the government. The elequent gentlemen (Mr. Boteler) who

receded him, had touched upon some interesting incidents and associations growing out of our revolutionary contest, he, Mr. F. would make some reference to our recent war with Mexico, as he found himself surrounded by many individuals and circumstances that made uch a reference peculiarly appropriate.

He would say nothing about the origin that war, for that was one of the party topics of that day, and he would say nothing that would in the remotest degree revive any party reminiscences. The landing of our troops pent Vera Cruz was regarded as a more successful military achievement than that of the allied armies on the shores of the Crimes.

That war exhibited the vest superiority of hood, and the array of beauty present was "a our race over the Mexican in all that constitutes military power. Courage, love of na-tional giory, power of andarance, military cience, perfection in all the instruments, mu nitions and equipments of war. In twenty three distinct battles and skirmishes-is mat tered not what was the disparity of numbers against us, or their positions of attack or deence, the victory was always on our side.

It exhibited the incomparable valor and reliability of our polunteers or citizen soldiery. This he illustrated by a particular reference to the battle of Buena Vista, which he described as the greatest battle ever fought on this con timent; where altered teconic american force were volunteers opposed to a six times greater force of Mexican regulars—the flower of tha Ropuldic, led on by Santa Anna.

It exhibited the vast importance of the difinstitutions like West Point. This was seen not only in the regular army-in the corps of Bugineers and Flying Artillery-but in the rolunteer regiments, many of which were commanded by graduates of West Point.

He then referred to the first regiment of Virginia Volunteers and traced its movements from its inception to its discharge, pointed out the error of the War Department in requiring it to rendezvous at Guyandotte, and his interesting interview with President Polk, at the request of the Governor of Virginia, at which it was corrected, and Richmond substituted as the place of rendezvous. Referred to the scene at which he was present at Fortress Monroe of the presentation to that regiment by the Governor of the State, of the flag voted oit by the Legislature.

He explained how it was that that regimen was not engaged in active heatilities with the enemy. It was ordered to the Rio Grande at that time the most attractive theatre of war-but before they reached there the battle of Buena Vista had been fought, which relieved our Southern frontier from the enema Gen. Scott with his division of the army had then landed at Vera Cruz, and was on his march to the City of Mexico. He had full authority for saying that earnest efforts were nade by the officers and men of that regiment o be transferred to a more active theatre, but they were resisted by GenaTaylor who still believed that another demonstration would be

made on that frontier.

He-referred to Col. Hamtrance, a citizen of that vicinity, who had been honored with the ommand of that regiment, and spoke of it as the bighest honor which it was at that time in the power of Virginia to bestow upon one of her citizens.

He deplored the order of the War Depart nent by which that regiment had been sent to the Rio Grande instead of Vera Cruz under Scott, and drew an imaginary picture of the distinction which it might have achieved in the various battles of Cerro Gordo, Contreras, &c., to the storming of the City of Mexico .-He said these were imaginary sketches it was true, you it was still a source of pride and con-Ciation that their entire deportment during the war had been such as to justify and render probable such imaginations. They had soquired the full confidence of their commen der-in-chief wherever stationed.

"They that do the best that circumstances allow Do well—angels could do no more." Mr. Faulkner closed his remark ing to the historical incidents connected with "Morgan's Spring," all of which had been so eloquently presented in detail by Mr. Boteler -said that be had often beard the parrative from the lips of Henry Bedinger, the last survivor of that gallant corps, and they had made

an indelible impression upon his memory. ANDREW HUNTER, Esq., followed Mr. F. in few felicitous and well timed remarks, which were well received and heartily applauded by the large crowd that hung around the stand He too alluded in glowing terms to the exploits of the American army at Buena Vista, and upon other battle fields on the plains of Mexico, and the superiority of our volunteers over the Mexican regulars. Spoke of the anxiety of some of the officers of the Virginia Regiment to participate in an engagement, and doubted not that they too would have shown them selves worthy of the name of Virginians .-He alluded to the heroic Gen. Taylor, and his bravery and determination in a very happy manner. But it is not within our power to follow bim through the whole speech, only a part of which it was our privilege to hear .-We regret that we are unable to furnish more full account of what he did say, but suffice it to say that all who heard it enjayed it as a rich treat, and spoke of it as one of the

happiest efforts of the day. THE DINNER.

When Mr. H. concluded, the Battalion was reformed and marched unarmed, to the only engagement allowed them on the ground .-In a beautiful grove, not far from the Spring. about two acres of table were spread with those things necessary for man's susten snoe and comfort, and right wall did the hungry soldiers behave, in attacking the already slaughtered Mutton and Pork.
