GOV. LETCHER has issued his proclamation for the election of Judges in a large majority of the Circuits in the State on the 4th Thursday in May.

No candidate has yet been announced in this Circuit, but we presume, by general consent the present estimable and excellent Judge, Richard Parker, will be re-elected without opposition.

AN OVERSIGHT.

The wire workers of the so-called Democratic party have certainly overlooked the fact that a Judge is to be elected in this judicial Circuit. Why, how can the party know for whom to vote, unless the *candidates* tell them? Why not put the machine in operation at once, lest some tricky Whig take the field? We call upon the *Democrats* in Districts 5 and 6 to let us know his *Programme*, so that the *Democrats* may be carried out.

Resolved, That the Democratic party will resist all attempts of renewing, in Congress or out, the agitation of this slavery question, in whatever shape or color the attempt may be made.

This resolution did not prevent the Democratic party, with Walker and Stanton as their exponents, from entering Kansas, and using all their influence in the slave State to keep the slaves from the South—it did not prevent the Democratic party from opposing in Congress, the admission of Kansas, as a slave State into the Union. It has not prevented the supporters of squatter sovereignty, of the Democratic party, in Congress and out of Congress, from agitating, by its false and insidious policy, the prevalence of slavery from our territories.

I therefore present myself to his place, without restriction.

When Mr. CHISHAM was on his way to do the above, he learned of Mr. Poyer having been arrested and placed under bonds. Mr. Poyer has also been arrested, and held to keep the peace.

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PERSONAL DIFFICULTY.

The angry colloquy between Morris Evans, of Wisconsin, and Parson, of Virginia, in the House of Representatives, on Wednesday of last week, led to a hostile message from the latter gentleman, which was accepted by the former. T. P. CHISHAM, of Va., was Mr. Poyer's second, F. W. LANGDON, of Massachusetts, Mr. Poyer's. Mr. Poyer's proposition was to fight with the common hosts, knaves! Mr. CHISHAM declaimed this proposition without consulting Mr. Poyer,

Resolved, That the Democratic party will resist all attempts of renewing, in Congress or out, the agitation of this slavery question, in whatever shape or color the attempt may be made.

Resolved, That the Democratic party will not recognize this vulgar, barbarous and inhuman mode of settling difficulties, as either a man among gentlemen, or consistent with the notions of civilized society.

Mr. Lander replied—

"You object to the terms. They were such as would injure my principal, who is unacquainted with the usual weapons of dueling, to meet your men on equal terms. He will not go out of this District, and I will not go out of mine." (The reporter of the non-duel) —the assertion that he will defend himself wherever assailed. He avowed, far as he was willing to name, his friends in the South, and the Unionists, who were most anxious to see his safety.
