PRINCIPLES, NOT MEN.

This has been the sent phrase of the self-styled Democratic leaders, when an effort has been made to decide the masses of their party, for the sake of the spoils. They meet in Convention, and after separating upon mere abstraction, and then adding themselves overwhelmingly to the National party, an effort is now being made to bring together the discordant elements by a union of the Seceders and the Douglasties, by supporting the same electoral ticket, through which a dead-hand stand is to be practised by the schemers upon the masters of their party. If they separate upon principle, how are they to unite upon principle in supporting the same electoral ticket? The spoils may induce them to unite, but not principle. As the Richmond Whig remarks,

There can be no union of the two wings of the Democracy in Virginia, or in any other State, in support of the same electoral ticket, without the most shameful falsehoods and abandonment of principle on the part of either the Seceders or the Douglasties.—The thing is simply impossible.
