The State Convention.

The Convention adjourned Wednesday week at 9 o'clock, to meet again on the 17th of June.

The business of the day was of an entirely sectional nature, but we are informed, was comparatively uneventful, consisting principally of a series of bills designed to put the business already transacted into permanent form.

It was voted that the events of the intervening forty days will produce a great deal of important work for the Convention, which could not be disposed of by the Legislature and hence the necessity of convening again.

The Governor is authorized to call the Convention together at any time during the recess if he deems it necessary to do so.

Harper's Ferry.

We copy the following from an extract in order to correct the statement:

A gentleman who has resided in the highest circles of society, and has arrived from Harper's Ferry, has to particularize the conduct of the Virginia forces that p. 1. He states that they are now scattered in various parts of the country, and the force of the 1st of July, has ranged from 3 to 50,000, and that there is a scarcity of provisions for all the men. No troops, visiting the Ferry can form any estimate of the number because they are scattered at every point commanding entrance to the town.

Our Town.

The city of Baltimore is being rapidly invested by United States troops. At noon Monday, two regiments, comprising New York, and Massachusetts troops 2,000 strong, under command of Gen. Butler, arrived at the Relay House and having taken possession of the telegraph office, proceeded to form a camp on the ground of the now deserted, adjoining those of Gen. W. Robins, Esq., on the South side of the tapet.

Governor Magoffin, of Kentucky, has issued his proclamation for the election of United States Congressmen to the extra session of Congress which is to commence at Washington on the 4th of July.

Gen. Harney has published a letter denouncing his loyalty to the Union and remonstrating against the secession of Missouri.

A large Union meeting was held at Wheeling on Saturday evening. Resistance to secession was urged and a division of the State favored. Delegates to a Convention of the Western counties were appointed.

A portion of the special election in Washington, D. C., on Saturday, indicated what is to be done.

The total of the State is five thousand, and over four thousand the county is five thousand.

Gen. H. S. Wright, Esq., has been appointed Major.

The division of Major will therefore assume upon him in the absence of the regular Major.

Military Affairs.
