Negroes in the Galleries of Congress

The Washington correspondent of the New York News, writing under date of the 8th, says This is the appearance in the galleries of both houses of large numbers of negroes and negresses, and the airs they put on is a caution. No decent people will sit on the seats behind them or near them, and thus there is always a wide vacant space be-tween them and the white people. The negroes clap their hands and grin and chatter like monkeys, whenever any of their friends on the floor make any allusion to the America citizens of African descent. I have seen dozens of ladies come to the doors of the gallery, look in astonshed at the sight that met their gaze, and then turn away and leave the Capitol sooner than be contaminated by sitting in the same gallery with the negroes and behind them, too. Negro equality here is advancing with rapid strides.

Every body is interested in knowing the ion of the currency of the country, since almost every body is echoing and re-echong the cry about a redundancy of paper money.

The Comptroller of the Currency is recommending an increase of the National Bank capital. Before the war the State banks had, (it is stated by a sensible writer in the National intelligencer,) a circulation of about two hunred millions dollars. The National Banks are restricted to two hundred and seventy millions. This looks like an increase; but this is not so, as the State Banks had their capital loaned to he people, whereas the National Banks have heirs loaned to the Government.

Currency is gradually becoming scarcer every day at Chicago, the great wheat market of the West. Money is bringing from ten to twenty per cent. per annum. The scarcity is oming general.

Negro Suffrage.

At a special election in Washington City, on Thursday last, on the subject of negro suffrage, out of over 6,000 votes only 85 were in favor of the proposition; yet the Postmaster, the U. S. Collector, the Register of Wills, and some other ultras, are fighting against the popular expression, and invoking Congress to force negro suffrage upon the people of the District.

It is generally thought that President Johnson will relieve these superlatively loyal gentlemen of the offices which they now hold, and from the duties of which they seem to have abundant time to meddle with politics and with the business of other people.

Private Griefs.

It is evident, from the tirades of Stevens and mner, that each of them is allowing the remembrance of a private grief to influence his public action-Stevens remembers his blasted iron works and the loss of his grey pony by the rebel raiders-and Sumner is not disposed to brook the defiant strains of Southern orators. Temporary Stay Law in Virginia The following temporary stay law has passe

both branches of the Virginia legislature. It is intended as a temporary measure of relief until a bill of a more permanent character is matured and passed:

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia, That no execution, venditioni expo-nas, attachment or other process to compel the payment of money, or the sale of property for that purpose, shall be issued, or, if heretofore issued, shall be proceeded with, and that no judgment, decree or order for the payment of money, rendered or made during the period upon any estate held or owned, or any intérest on such estate by the person or persons against whom such judgement, decree or order may be rendered or made. Nor shall there be any sale under a deed of trust, mortgage, pledge, or other security; nor under any judgment, de-cree or order for the payment of any money, while this act remains in force, unless by con-sent of parties; provided, that no part of this act shall apply to the cities of Norfolk and Portsmouth, nor the counties of Accomac, North-ampton, Norfolk, and Princess Anne; but the act entitled "an act staying the collection of debts," passed January 23d, 1864, and the amendment thereof, passed June 23d, 1865, shall remain in force so far as the said cities and counties are concerned, with the exception that sales of property may take place, under the judgement and decree of court, in cases where the collection of debts is not the object

2. If any execution shall have been levied before the passage of this act, the property levied on shall be restored to the defendant, but shall remain subject to the lien of the execution aforesaid.

3. This act shall be in force from its passage. and shall so continue during the present session of this General Assembly, unless sooner altered, amended or repealed.

The proposed amendment of the Constitution providing for the abolition of slavery forever within the limits of the country has been ratified by each one of those States with the exception of Mississippi, from which no official information has been received, and in nearly all them measures have been adopted or are now pending to confer upon freedmen the privileges which are essential to their comfort, protection and security. In Florida and Texas the people are making commendable progress in restoring their State governments, and no doubt is entertained that they will at an early period be in a tained that they will at an early period be in a condition to resume all of their practical relations with the Federal Government.

In, that portion of the Union lately in rebellion" the aspect of affairs is more promising than, in view of all the circumstances, could well have been expected. The people through-out the entire South evince a laudable desire to renew their allegiance to the Government, and to repair the devastations of war by a promp and cheerful return to peaceful pursuits. An abiding faith is entertained that their actions will conform to their professions, and that in acknowledging the supremacy of the Constitu-tion and the laws of the United States their loyalty will be unreservedly given to the Gov-ernment, whose leniency they cannot fail to ap-preciate, and whose fostering care will soon re-store them to a condition of prosperity. It is true that in some of the States the demoralizing effects of the war are to be seen in occasion disorders, but these are local in character, not frequentin occurrence, and are rapidly disappearing as the civil authority is extended and sustained. Perplexing questions were naturally to peexpected from the great and sudden change in the relations between the two races: but systems are gradually developing themselves un-der which the freedmen will receive the proeriod tection to which he is justly entitled, and by means of his labor, make himself a useful and independent member of the community in which he has his home.

From all the information in my poses and from that which I have recently derived from the most reliable authority, I am induced to cherish the belief that sectional anamosity is surely and rapidly merging itself into a spirit of nationality, and that representation, connected with a properly adjusted system of taxation, will result in a harmonious restoration of the relations of the States to the National Union.
